A green roof in Moseley by Emilia Faux

I have cultivated my small garden for over 25 years and I am always on the lookout for new space. When we needed a new shed, a green roof presented a perfect opportunity. The first lockdown with glorious spring weather provided us with time for the project. The shed began to take shape out of skip finds, unused materials in friends' sheds and a few new items for the main framework and to waterproof the newly-created roof box before filling it with a 20/80% mix of soil and broken brick to a depth of 12 cm. This was the moment when the real fun began for me - planting! I opted for a varied collection of plants which could survive and thrive in an exposed, shallow, dry growing medium. Over the next few months, I grew various alpines, succulents, wild flowers and herbs, from seeds and cuttings and planted them on the roof in the autumn of 2020. Magpies took a keen interest in the roof's 'offerings', forcing us eventually to net the whole lot to give the new arrivals a chance to put down roots. This was a wise move. From Spring 2021 and this summer, my roof plants have settled, flowered and relaxed to fill the available space. Now it is a colourful mat of purples, pinks, whites, shades of greens and yellows, reds and terracotta in varying shapes and habits. The maintenance is negligible and it continues to be a favourite playground for the magpies. They seem to do a lot of tidying up, inadvertently 'propagating' the sedums across the roof and into the gravel below. The green roof protects the shed from the weather but more importantly, giving us endless joy and fascination each day. Moor Green Primary Academy's edible garden

This year, Moor Green Primary School was awarded one of MiB's £500grants. They tell us that throughout the academic year, children from Y4 participated in a project called 'Seeds to Supper', beginning with seedlings which they planted out on the playground. The children used wheelbarrows to deliver the soil and compost to the new planters as well as topping up existing planters in their edible garden. They planted produce including tomatoes, onions, courgettes and sweetcorn. During the final week of term, they are having a 'grow, cook, eat' event where they make mini pizzas over the campfire in Forest School. Further, they were even able to sell some of the produce to the community!
