Water - water - water

How did you, or rather your garden, cope with this Summer's heat and lack of water? Did you continue to tend a lovely lawn, mowing regularly and watering frequently? Did you leave the grass alone and plant wild flowers? Did you water all of the garden or just part of it? Which plants did you find coped best with the hot dry weather?

I increased my collection of water butts to four, buying one of the bargains offered by Severn Trent – still available I believe. I had realised that although I was collecting water from the shed roof and the small extension roof, I was not collecting from the main roof of the house. All the butts are of course now full and I hope that next summer I will not need to use tap water for the garden.

You may be considering changes to the planting in the garden. Some plants really did not like the heat while others survived well and continued to give colour. We would love to hear about your gardening experiences this year and, if as predicted, we are going to have more hot, dry months, it would be great to share ideas and tips to help others in their horticultural efforts. The Moseley Roundabout - update

At the junction of Salisbury Road, Russell Road, Edgbaston Road and Willows Road is the roundabout that we used to call 'Exotic'. In 2006 it was set up as a tropically-planted roundel by the original Chair of Moseley in Bloom and the then Head of Floral Enhancement at Birmingham City Council. The arrangement was that BCC Highways continued to manage its infrastructure but it allowed Moseley in Bloom to arrange and receive directly sponsorship monies which helped BCC Parks and Nurseries continue to manage the horticulture. A long-term sponsorship deal kept this arrangement funded until December 2021. After this, MiB searched unsuccessfully for a new sponsor and reluctantly handed the roundabout back to the City Council in May 2022. This is not a project that our volunteers can actively work on due to both access and safety, and as a charity, Moseley in Bloom does not have the funds to cover the costs now needed. As a local action group we continue to keep tabs on the roundabout as we are well aware that it currently looks stressed, shabby and unloved. BCC Parks and Nurseries are aware and will be dealing with it 'in the near future'. We will keep a Moseley eye on it.





10 Ways to Prepare Your Garden for Winter

- 1. Clean up diseased plants. Leave the rest in place.
- 2. Remove invasive weeds that have taken hold over the growing season.
- 3. Enrich soil with manure and compost, or organic fertilizers such for spring.
- 4. Plant cover crops (beans, peas) to enrich the soil with a natural fertiliser.
- 5. Prune perennials with care, seed heads make excellent meals for wildlife.
- 6. Divide bulbs and replant daffodils, tulips and crocuses.
- 7. Harvest and regenerate your compost.
- 8. Replenish mulch to ease the transition into winter.
- 9. Review the plants in your garden and assess your growing season.
- 10. Clean and sharpen tools and pop away until spring.
