School Projects - Moor Green Pizza Planters & Community Garden (2021-2023)

Throughout the academic year, children from Y4 participated in a project called 'Seeds to Supper', The children used wheelbarrows to deliver the soil and compost to the new circular planters as well as topping up the existing planters in our edible garden. They chose the topping for their pizzas and began by planting seedlings. They chose tomatoes, onions, courgettes and sweetcorn. During the final week of term, we planned a 'grow, cook, eat' event with the children where they were to make mini pizzas over the campfire in Forest School. Unfortunately because of the heatwave we were not able to have a campfire in the woods or even put the oven on in school to cook the pizzas. In fact in the end school was completely closed on the afternoons that we had planned for this event! We had planned for the children to make their own tomato sauce for the base, and then choose their toppings! They would also have had a choice of a side dish potato salad or a dressed green salad made from produce grown as part of the project. Strawberries and cream had been planned as dessert. Our Community Garden is coming on apace. We have created 6 new beds on the turfed areas of the caretaker's garden using the nodig method. The children have had lots of fun learning that the compost is made from the rotted dung from our school farm and then helping to fill the beds with it using trowels and buckets. They have planted onions, garlic and shallots to overwinter. There are also broad beans and sweet peas in our greenhouse on our school allotment and potatoes chitting in the Eco Room.
