




High Street Nightmare!

Box Moths...

Box moths, which first appeared in the UK about 10 years ago, have now become a major threat. They totally consumed the foliage on 16 well-established box balls in my garden this year. I had no choice but to dig them up as they were now dead. They've devoured all the box bushes and hedges along School Road and, from what I've been told, throughout much of Moseley. The moths are an even greater threat to box than box blight and are very difficult, if not impossible to control. Digging infected shrubs up and killing the caterpillars is the best solution to prevent the moths developing. I immersed my box bushes in water to drown them.) You can get advice from local nurseries or from Google on what to plant in the place of box. Good luck! Wendy Weston
